Cambridge Caryl Phillips

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one of england s most widely acclaimed young novelists adopts two eerily convincing narrative voices and juxtaposes their stories to devastating effect in this mesmerizing portrait of slavery cambridge is a devoutly christian slave in the west indies whose sense of justice is both profound and self destructive while emily is a morally blind genteel englishwoman

the term postcolonial literatures in english designates english language literatures from africa asia the americas and oceania as well as the literatures of diasporic communities who have moved from those regions to the global north this volume introduces the central themes of postcolonial literary studies and delineates how these themes are reflected and elaborated in exemplary literary works by postcolonial authors

from around the world it also offers succinct definitions of key terms like orientalism hybridity indigeneity or writing back

this text offers a critical perspective on fiction from the west indies the writers are from diverse backgrounds with differing artistic perspectives but share a commitment to a repossession of caribbean life and consciousness the writers are senior edgell phillips naipul and antoni

literary and sociological studies have long been fascinated by the seemingly innocuous substance of sugar not least because of its direct link with the histories of slavery in the new world unlike previous texts slaves to sweetness examines not only traditional classic studies of the history of sugar but also explores the previously ignored work produced by expatriate caribbean authors from the 1980s onward as a result this volume provides the most comprehensive account to date of the historical transformations undergone by our representations of sugar making it a rich resource for scholars in numerous fields

postcolonial justice addresses a major issue in current postcolonial theory and beyond namely the question of how to reconcile an ethics grounded in the reciprocal acknowledgment of diversity and difference with the normative if not universal thrust that appears to energize any notion of justice the concept of postcolonial justice shared by the essays in this volume carries an unwavering commitment to difference within and beyond europe while equally rejecting radical cultural essentialisms which refuse to engage in utopian ideals of convivial exchange across a plurality of subject positions such utopian ideals can no longer claim universal validity as in the tradition of the european enlightenment instead they are bound to local frames of speaking from which they project world

aspect that ultimately distinguished this new kind of slavery from indigenous forms of servitude was capital the mechanisms constituting this enterprise can be attributed to the rising cultural systems of capitalism and consumer culture exploiting cheap labour to satisfy the demand for foreign goods such as sugar in european societies trading and exploiting african people came to be understood as a business venture degrading human beings to a mere commodity and means of production owned by businessmen such as the father of one of cambridge s main characters emily cartwright her experiences and her thoughts on the enslaved people working on the unnamed caribbean island home to her father s estate give insight into the racist perception of black people in distant europe in contrast the reader gets to see the cruelties of slavery through the eyes of the novel s namesake cambridge together these completely distinct perspectives create a profound image of slavery as an institution the capitalist forces behind it as well as the prejudices necessary to facilitate and maintain this atrocious enterprise
